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Welcome to HSCI 180 – Introduction to Medical Terminology. I am a registered nurse with a background in pediatrics at UVA Medical Center. I currently teach in the Murphy Deming RN-BSN program, as well as at John Tyler Community College and Richard Bland College of William and Mary. Teaching students interested in the medical field is my passion, both in the classroom and online. This course is exciting for students as they watch their medical vocabulary expand week after week. An understanding of medical terminology is beneficial even for students not pursuing a medical career, as we are all exposed to medical terms in our own health journey and in our everyday lives in our community. This is a helpful course for anyone!

COURSE DESCRIPTION

HSCI 180 Medical Terminology provides an understanding of medical abbreviations and terms. It includes the study of prefixes, suffixes, word stems, and technical terms with an emphasis on proper spelling, pronunciation, and usage. It emphasizes more complex skills and techniques in understanding medical terminology.

I check email frequently throughout the day, so it is likely that I will get back to you much more quickly than that. However, please check back for responses in the evening as well. **It is the student's responsibility to check the announcement page on Canvas and e-mail daily in order to have the most current information. I will post an announcement on Canvas weekly with reminders and updates for the week.**

Any confidential concerns students may have can be discussed with the instructor through e-mail. **I also am happy to speak with you by phone if needed.** Students are welcome and encouraged to communicate with the instructor.

COURSE CALENDAR

The Course Calendar is at the end of this syllabus and also posted under the **Course Calendar** tab in the Canvas course. You will note the assignments are divided by weeks

and all topics, assignments, due dates and important college dates have been included. I will send out a weekly announcement with a summary of your week's assignments and reminders.

ASSIGNMENTS (see specific details below)

There will be weekly online open book quizzes and Pearson labs that will be due each Sunday night. There is ample time allowed for completion of all required work. Last-minute problems can be avoided by completing the assignments and exams earlier rather than later during the available dates. If there are extenuating circumstances that prevent completing an assignment on time (such as a death in the family, extended illness), **please e-mail the instructor to make other arrangements prior to the assignment due date.** With rare exception, I will have assignments graded and grades posted within a week of the due date. Most weeks they are posted within 48 hours.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance in the online course is required and defined as active participation in the course. Online courses will, at minimum, have weekly assignments to record student participation, which can be documented by any or all of the following methods:

- Completion of tests
- Submission/completion of assignments
- Participation in Discussion Board Forums
- Communication with the instructor

Students who fail to maintain this active (at least weekly) participation will be processed in accordance with college policy.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Quizzes— Each week students will be expected to read the assigned chapters in the textbook. With each chapter there will be a quiz which will be taken on Canvas. **Please see the due dates for each week's quiz.** Quizzes are normally due at 11:59 PM each Sunday, but please check course calendar for weekly assignments and due dates.

Students are encouraged to use their textbooks and notes from each chapter to complete these quizzes. Unlike unit tests, there is no time limit and you may attempt the quizzes multiple times to get the best grade before the due date. I plan to have all quizzes for the semester open from the beginning of the course, so if you know you need to work ahead due to work/ family responsibilities, you will have that option. Even though all quizzes will be open at once, there is a quiz or quizzes due weekly – so please

pay attention to your course calendar. All work submitted for a grade must be received by the due date. **There will be a 10% deduction per day for late work, up to three days, unless prior arrangements have been made with the instructor.**

It is the student's responsibility to check the online grade book for a numerical grade immediately after completing the quizzes. If there is a problem with your computer or the Canvas server you might see a padlock symbol or question mark instead of a numerical grade. **If this happens you need to contact the instructor to have your quiz reset (before the due date). Keep in mind that you must allow 24 hours for a response to your e-mail, so completing homework quizzes early will leave time to correct any computer problems before the due date.**

Tests: You will have three tests and a final exam. These tests will be 50 multiple choice questions related to meanings of word roots, prefixes, suffixes and medical terms. Study guides will be provided to help you narrow your focus for the tests.

All tests are timed. You have 1 hour and 30 minutes to complete each test. If you experience a major extenuating circumstance that prevents you from taking a test, such as a death in the family or extended illness, you may be allowed to make-up the test at the instructor's discretion. **You must contact the instructor before the test due date to request a make-up test.** Students who fail to contact the instructor prior to the due date will receive a "0" for that test.

My Medical Terminology Lab

A significant part of your learning will be accessed on the My Medical Terminology Lab program website. You should log into the site during your first week and become familiar with the layout, activities, and learning opportunities. In addition to the activities, games, quizzes, etc., you will also find PowerPoint and Lectures on the site that are from the textbook resources. .

Home page and also in Module Week One. There will be an attachment titled My Medical Terminology Lab. **Make sure that you enter into the course with the course number provided; otherwise, I will be unable to see the required work that you complete for points.**

You may complete as many of the activities as you would like, and the more the better, but you must complete 5 activities for each chapter. **Note that listening to the lecture on Pearson is encouraged, but does not count towards points earned.** This portion of your grade is based on completion. You must complete 5 activities for each chapter, and score greater than 50 % on each of them. If you complete more than 5 activities for each chapter, I will choose your best work for your grade. **The activities may be performed as many times as you would like;** however, I will check the site for your postings after the due date each week and record your number of points earned. While you may continue to retake and participate in the chapter activities throughout the semester, the work chosen for points will have the cutoff date and time listed on your course calendar.

This is how you will be graded for this portion of your learning:

If you have completed 5 activities and scored 50 % or greater on EACH of them, you will earn 10/10 points for that chapter. Anything below 50 % will not count towards your 5 activities. If you have completed less than 5 at this percentage, you will earn 0/10 points.

You have the potential to earn 10 points per chapter for a total of 130 points! That is a significant number of points you can earn by participating in activities which will reinforce your learning. It can serve as “forced study time” and benefit your grade at the same time. Do not rush through these activities. They are for your learning. Take your time; review the material regularly; reinforce your learning consistently—this is how you will be successful in this course. Study these questions and activities.

Technical Requirements:

In order to participate in this online course, the student must have access to a computer, word processing software, and an Internet connection. You will complete this course using the learning management system Canvas.

Instructional Methods:

This course will be taught entirely online and therefore the instructional methods are adapted to the Canvas environment. The primary instructional methods are videos ,

discussions, and collaborative learning. A variety of supplemental resources are provided on the Canvas site to support multiple learning styles.

The Discussion Board/Activities offer an innovative way to share knowledge, experiences, and insight with everyone in the class and is available 24/7. You will have several discussion board posts in this course; You may develop and edit your submissions in MS Word, but cut and paste them directly to the thread. Do not use attachments for discussion board assignments. Make sure that your heading includes your name.
