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Text: Wolfe, *Sensation and Perception*, 4th edition.

Course objectives: This course will teach the principles and phenomena related to the sensation and perception of stimuli from our environment. The course will cover the major sense organs, the stimuli to which they respond and how perceptual processes extract information.

Course Requirements:

- 1.) Every week students will be required to respond to a **Discussion Board Question (DBQ)** relating to that week's material. You will make your initial post by Friday of each week and post a response to a classmate post by the end of the day Sunday. These assignments will be worth 25% of your grade.
- 2.) **Quizzes.** Most weeks there will be a short on-line quiz covering the assigned chapters for that particular week. You must take the quiz by the end of the day Sunday. Quizzes will be worth 25% of your grade.
- 3.) **Exams** – There will be a midterm and final exam. Exams may be a combination of multiple choice, short answer and essay questions. The midterm exam will be worth 25% of your final grade and the final will be worth 25% of your grade.
